	A trial took place in August that allowed people to use their concessionary pass at any time.

	Usually, people would not be able to use their pass before 09.30am.
	A second trial will be taking place for all of November.
	This will be taking place on buses only.
	The trial is open to anyone who has a disabled people's or older people's concessionary pass given to them by TfGM.
	At the end of the trial period, feedback will be looked at to see if the change can be made permanent.
	Full details about the trial, types of concessionary pass, and how to provide feedback are available on TfGM's website.
	Neighbourhood Transport Review
	TfGM is looking at how we can improve our Ring and Ride and Local Link services.

	This is a long-term plan that looks at how we travel across Greater Manchester in the years ahead.
ŶŶ	We spoke to equalities groups on this topic between January 2024 and February 2025. Their feedback has shaped the draft Transport Strategy.
	This consultation is your chance to help TfGM make decisions on how to make travel easier, safer and greener.

	GMCA Consultation on Clean Air ANPR camera use
0-0	GMCA are thinking about changing how some Automatic Number Plate Recognition (ANPR) cameras in Greater Manchester are used.
	The cameras were originally set up to help with charges for the Clean Air Zone.
	The charging zone is not happening. Greater Manchester Police (GMP) want to use the cameras instead to help make the region safer for everyone.

GMCA would like feedback to understand what people think about this idea and if it should go ahead.

Refreshing our Mobility Scooter Policy for greater accessibility
TfGM is currently updating its Mobility Scooter Policy.

We will be holding a targeted engagement session to hear from users and communities about their experiences and needs.

The DDRG were introduced to members of the Rail Integration team.
DDRG members were asked about their ideas on tickets, stations, and reliability.
The group were asked about what to include in the guidance given to TfGM colleagues who present to DDRG. They were also asked about how it should look.
The DDRG have also been leading a project looking at how attitudes can make travel inaccessible and how this can be changed.
We are now putting together a written summary of the findings and looking at next steps.


